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Interview with Ann Marie Ramsundar-Radhay Assistant Accountant

Tell me something about yourself that most people in PLNL may not know?

I never had any burning desire to be an Accountant. I really wanted to be a Marine Biologist, but at the time (a long time ago) there was little or no scope for that sort of thing in T&T.

I decided to do Accounting because a Manager I once worked with asked me to challenge myself. I had never done business studies prior to this. I still love being in nature, but I don't often get the opportunity, so I make do with a greenhouse, where I raise ornamental plants.

How different is your experience today from when you first started at the then FMCL?

I think that the sense of "family" that was very evident when FMCL was started has been somewhat cast aside. For all of the training that we are doing with JMW and attempting to unify the organization and its goals and objectives, I think we have lost some of the love we had back then.

What would you say has been your most challenging experience to date in this industry? (Not necessarily at PLNL).

Turnarounds are always a challenge, and not just for those in its direct path. When I worked in materials at another organization, I was very much involved in stock replenishment for turnarounds, and found this to be very exciting, but challenging. Later, when I moved to Accounting, I discovered that the paper trail generated by turnarounds is a very long and winding one which takes a long time to maneuver through.

What do you like most about working at PLNL? Has there been any downside to this experience thus far?

I like working at PLNL for the range of experiences I get, and for all the different aspects of its operations that I am exposed to. I know that I would not have been so privileged at a larger organization where there may be much specialization and narrowness of functions. I love the collaborative atmosphere we have created here.

The downside to working here is the lack of a comprehensive succession plan. I know PLNL is a lean organization, but there is need for such a plan if the organization wants to retain staff as it would allow for clear career progression and job satisfaction.

In terms of the Company's Vision, what do you see as your role in making PLNL become "the preferred employer?"

PLNL's competitive advantage will always be in our people. I think my best contribution will be in the development and mentoring of the younger people who may not have had the experiences and exposure that I would have had over the years. Sometimes a person does not have to make the mistake and learn from it, if someone can help them avoid it and find a better solution. In that regard, I would like the younger members of this organization to respect the advice of their seniors.

How do you plan to fulfill the Company's Mission during the next five years?

Ha! Ha! You are assuming that I will be here in five years' time, and not tending to my greenhouse. But seriously, I can say that I have always believed in teamwork and collaboration and I will continue to work towards that as far as I can. My hope is that we can all realize that we are in this thing together, and that we can only achieve excellence if we all work together towards our goals. I believe my biggest contribution for the future will be in the development of people, I have set personal goals in this regard and I will do my best to achieve these.

Would you like to comment on the challenges you see in getting everyone at PLNL to 'live' out our Values

There are still many out there in our family that have not

fully bought in to the concepts espoused in our values, either because they are resisting change, or have their own personal agendas. I believe that we all need to live what we preach, from top management through the ranks. I think some people are resisting because they do not feel that the management is as genuinely committed as they would like us to believe. We need to walk the talk now.


What do you hope to accomplish during your tenure with this Company both at a personal and business level?

The Meteorological office hadn't announced the rainy season, but it started raining around noon. Quarter to one, eight-hour-day workers are looking forward to the weekend and the complex is winding down. Someone sticks their head out the back door, comes back in "Aye, it real raining boy, outside white". There's a crowd in the kitchen. Another tech looks out the front door, "that rain coming from the sea. It blowing wrong-side out there." "Allyuh know this plant don't like no setta setta rain..." It's colder than usual for lunchtime in control. "Watch that IOI alarm" a panel man says. Lights out!

When you give contractors an orientation after they've looked at the five minute video, you tell them they can always go to the security building or to the control room; Someone's always there and the lights stay on. "What the..." alarms on, screen fills up, horns blaring. "Ah ****!" The kitchen empties, lights back up, "IOIJ trip allyuh." Phone rings "Control, everything all right?" "No, IOI trip."...phone rings again, people think we have time to converse, "Arright, aright", "watch it, watch the steam, watch the steam", "hold the reformer and leh we find out what going on," hat, raincoat, radio, into the rain. "Call Maintenance and E&I, what the **** happen?"

Operators start securing the plant. Panel operators evaluating, giving directions, stabilizing the front end and isolating the back. "Radios are hard to hear, control calls over the Gaitronics "Somebody, start the lift pumps on the IOI, start the lift pumps.""Pumps on", comes back the call, "the pump switch on, they not running," "lift pump not starting," "put the hogger ejector on line, I need the hogger ejector now!""Roger, roger.""E& I going to check the lift pumps.""Secure the PGRU, close the PGRU inlet; Bypass the ARU; Somebody take down one of the I2IJ's."
